KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Success Coaching experienced increases in student engagement throughout the year including a 13% increase in overall Success Coaching appointments and a 3% increase in unique appointments. 



FINANCIAL LITERACY WEEK

Oberlin's inaugural Financial Literacy Week (sponsored by the Center for Student Success Success Coaching core function and the Office of Financial Aid) kicked off in February of 2023 in collaboration with the Office of Financial Aid. The week-long event focused on teaching Obies critical skills around money management and fiscal wellness. Achieve Credit Union sponsored its second annual financial literacy workshop series, and the United Way of Greater Lorain County sponsored a tax workshop and free tax assistance sessions for students. Oberlin College Libraries, Student Senate, and the Office of the Dean of Students also provided support by sponsoring additional events for students to expand their knowledge of financial health strategies.




Key Accomplishments

Students self-reported an increase in learning across all three LEAD student learning outcomes in the fall and spring post-assessments.






91% of students reported being satisfied or somewhat satisfied with the entire LEAD program.






The Class of 2027's Top 5



Education about CliftonStrengths continued through fall semester with those attending events reporting satisfaction with their experience.



What students are saying about CliftonStrengths:






